15.45–16.45	Session 4: Round-table on Think-tanks Cooperation for Achievement of SDGs in South Asia  Successful achievement of SDGs in South Asia will not only result from governmental actions. The civil society and think-tanks of the region have to play an important supportive role by providing evidence-base and advocacy for transformative policy changes.
